25. Sexuality, Gender, and Culture: From Inquiry to Action

Transgender and queer issues are often spotlighted in politics, religion, education, media and the workplace; yet, the lived experiences of LGBT individuals and communities are often obscured. While public perceptions of gender and gender norms may be shifting, the marginalization of women, trans, and queer folks within heteropatriarchy remains unexamined. Cultural differences regarding both sexuality and gender are alternately minimized, mobilized, and eroticized for politics and profit. Our conceptions and performances of sexuality, gender and culture—while contradictory and contested—are inextricably intertwined and inevitably shaped by each other.

She is also a potter and artist, and she brings her creative interests into the classroom and scholarly work. She is the author of Intercultural Communication: Globalization and Social Justice, co-editor of Globalizing Intercultural Communication, and has published a variety of articles related to intercultural communication, gender, and social justice.

We will discuss strategies for implementing these activities in different settings, and identifying ways to turn such brief experiences into purposeful and long-lasting learning for your audiences. Drawing on AFS's 60+ years of experience in facilitating intercultural learning, trainers from AFS Intercultural Programs will lead this highly interactive workshop and share their best practices in developing Student and Host Family Learning Journeys that engage participants throughout their study abroad programs and beyond.
