26. Inspiring Curiosity: Fostering Intercultural and Global Competence for Students, Host Families, Faculty, and Staff

Building intercultural competence and increasing your sensitivity to cultural differences can be a lengthy process requiring extensive experience, reflection, and support. However, engaging participants (study abroad students, faculty, or staff) in activities to develop intercultural competences is always a challenge as most of them do not perceive such skills as something they need. How do you inspire their curiosity in those instances? In this session, you will get a chance to facilitate quick and easy-to-adapt experiential learning activities aimed at creating meaningful reflections and enhancing intercultural skills. We will discuss strategies for implementing these activities in different settings, and identifying ways to turn such brief experiences into purposeful and long-lasting learning for your audiences. Drawing on AFS's 60+ years of experience in facilitating intercultural learning, trainers from AFS Intercultural Programs will lead this highly interactive workshop and share their best practices in developing Student and Host Family Learning Journeys that engage participants throughout their study abroad programs and beyond.
