As I write, I am finishing a fabulous novel, "The Overstory" by Richard Comments Powers. Written earlier this year, this bestseller is about reimaging the human place in the world, the living

world, particularly through encounters with trees and forests. There are nine main human characters, unknown to each other at the outset, each having encounters with trees - some dramatic, some very subtle - in different ways in a variety of situations. All of them eventually come together in a last attempt to save North America's few remaining acres of old growth/virgin forests. It is a rich, very readable book that calls out for us to see and experience life in a different, interconnected way.

One of the characters, Patricia, a shy woman, botanist and PhD, whose "expertise" and experience in the woods enlightens her to many ground breaking discoveries of the nature of trees and how they interact with each other and everything around them. In her later years, while living nearly alone in a cabinresearch lab in a forest, she's asked to write a book in order for the general public to understand what she has learned and experienced. Of the many profound insights she writes is this:

> "Before it dies, a Douglas-fir, half a milleniaum old, will send its storehouse of chemicals back down into its roots and out through its fungal partners, donating its riches to the community pool in a last will and testament. We might well call these ancient benefactors giving trees."

As I thought about this new year ahead of us at Second Baptist Church, it came to me that this is what all of us who are followers of the Way of Jesus are called to do: send the storehouses of our spirit, wisdom, compassion and generosity to the world, to every person and every living being. Indeed, like the Douglas-fir, we receive and are filled with physical and spiritual gifts in order that we might grow into the children of God that we are created to be. And at the very same time, we are "giving trees" with storehouses of love and goodness to be shared with the whole community of life.

Let this new year be one of giving from our storehouses of love.


Adult Education begins Sunday, September 9th

Our Doors are Open Let it Shine - AUGUST UPDATE Capital Campaign April 2018 - April 2021

Our fundraising efforts have yielded 74 pledges with commitments of \$339,147 as of our last Capital Campaign meeting, July 31, 2018. The actual cash collected and available is \$213,961 which is 61% of our goal. These funds include two grants that are to be used to improve accessibility to the building. Our fundraising efforts now are focusing on community outreach contributions including solicitations of local business and groups operating in Suffield, especially those that use our facility or benefit from Second Baptist presence in the center of town. We have already received some of these donations from those that wish to remain anonymous. We are blessed that First Baptist was able to open their doors for worship earlier than expected as egress to our building is very much a construction zone during August.

Projects Completed or in-process: The offices have been enjoying the individual room-controlled High Efficiency Heat pumps for cooling at a cost of \$14,223. Seven WI FI Thermostats have been installed so house volunteers can manage temperature controls remotely to help with pipe freezing issues we have dealt with the past few years \$3,426. The grant funds have been spent to install electric door openers by the back entrance to Fellowship Hall at a cost of \$11,539. Additionally, we have installed an electric door opener by the ladies bathroom also on the Fellowship Hall level. These door openers have been operational since mid-July — and the exterior button is well concealed in the rock wall — so make sure to look for it as some have said it blends in nicely so was hard to see. Once the handicap accessibility is completed, we will need to provide pictures and a sign to acknowledge the Zak Grant for their contribution to this specific goal. An energy efficient door has been installed on the north side of the Prior Wing as the former door had single panes of glass and was very heavy. Also, a new storm door for the kitchen has been installed with a total cost of both doors of \$2,580. The two oil tanks have been removed this week at a cost of \$5,950 and we were fortunate that there was not water in them as pumping would have cost another \$1000+. We are in the process of covering the water stained ceilings with sheet rock in the Welcome Center, Parlor, and Kneece Chapel hallway and bathrooms at an estimated cost of \$7,600. So watch out for those tarps if you are entering any of these areas.

I want to give special thanks to the House Volunteers for their significant contributions. House is doing hours of pre-work before vendors arrive by moving furniture, removing and installing light fixtures... getting multiple quotes, supervising the work daily and negotiating significant savings for the church. We are truly blessed by each of you.

More to come: As of this writing, we are awaiting multiple proposals on paving the front lot, the north side driveway where one of the Oil tanks was removed as well as the new proposed handicap parking spaces by Fellowship Hall. Additional bids are also being received to repair the crumbling retaining wall by the North Prior entrance as well as secure the scrolled walkway fence on the North entrance that has become a hazard. Now that the oil tanks have been removed, we can proceed with exterior painting by our chosen restoration company that will proceed with scraping and painting of pillars, shutters, windows, bell tower and dome which will begin in earnest mid-August.

Interior work continues with painting the hallway by Fellowship Hall and the bathrooms which are being reconfigured for better handicap accessibility including removal and replacement of some of the entrance tiles by Fellowship Hall and outside the Kneece Chapel entrances.

Overall, we expect many of our improvements will be complete before Homecoming Sunday in September. While the summer focus has been on exterior projects, interior work continues this fall including reconfiguring the Kneece Chapel with movable seating, completion of the smoke detectors in the Sanctuary and replacement of the two spotlights above the cross near the baptistery with efficient LED bulbs.
