You probably know by now that I really like poetry. I know there are some who don't – either a particular type or form, or any kind of

poetry. That's OK with me; we are all touched and moved by different forms of expression in different ways or no way at all. I don't know if I ever told you why I like most forms of poetry. Here's five reasons.

The first is because poetry creates images in my mind which, if I open myself to them, move in me in ways that touch places in my mind, heart, soul that other forms of expression do not. Because they are not visual in form, my own imagination is invited to see these images in ways that I might never have if they were presented to me in a painting or photograph or some other visual art.

Secondly, poetry leaves a lot out; there are "blank spaces" that I have to "fill in" or "fill up." Unlike prose, I'm often left to complete the thoughts, suggestions, passions and pathos of the poet for myself. It doesn't tell me everything; the kind of poetry I like is not a "how to" manual; it's a "step-into" world for my mind, heart, spirit.

Third, poetry calls me to act – some way, somehow – but doesn't tell me precisely how I should act: spiritually, personally, politically, prophetically. Poetry that grips me is often an indictment of a way of life or the "way things are" and is usually a clear call to work for justice and peace and the integrity of creation, but it does not set out a legislative-like agenda on how it must be done. Perhaps this is why political leaders from oppressive regimes and/or countries, fear and silence the poets, artists, musicians and playwrights first and most harshly.

Fourth, the poetry that speaks to me, speaks to me differently at different times in my life in different circumstances. Like when I read the Bible and come to a very different understanding at one moment than I did at an earlier time in my life, depending on my particular context

and what's going on in the world, there are poems I've read a hundred times that can seem like I'm reading them for the first time when the context is different.

Fifth, poetry (and most music) seems to crack open my often hard heart to the presence of something much deeper and more profound than my everyday living; it often touches my soul. And when one's heart is opened or one's soul is touched, you can begin to sense the Presence of God, the One who is too often hidden from our normal sight and begin to rest in God who is Love. The poem below is a favorite of mine that I pull from my files and read when I am troubled by things in my personal and family life or, more typically, when the news of what we are doing to the world and each other leads me to despair. It's called, "The Peace of Wild Things," by the Kentucky farmer, poet and prophet, Wendell Berry.

The Peace of Wild Things

When despair grows in me and I wake in the middle of the night at the least sound in four of what my life and my children's live.

in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be,

I go and lie down where the wood drake rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds.

I come into the peace of wild things who do not tax their lives with forethought of grief. I come into the presence of still water.

And I feel above me the day-blind stars waiting for their light. For a time

I rest in the grace of the world, and am free.

The letter below was written by The Reverend Judy Allbee, Executive Minister of the American Baptist Churches of Connecticut (ABCCONN) announcing her retirement effective September 30, 2016. We give thanks to God for her ministry and pray God's blessing upon Judy and our ABCCONN family in this time of transition.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ on the Board of Managers,

It is with very mixed emotions that I submit to you my letter of retirement as Executive Minister of the American Baptist Churches of Connecticut and ask that you receive this in the spirit in which it is given.

I have been in active ministry for 33 years, and the majority of this time has been right here in Connecticut. I began here as a pastor, then as an area minister. When I came back to work with you in 2005, I had no idea how God would use me in this position or how God would use us together to further the gospel. It became clear early on that this is a wonderful place to be in ministry and I was so glad to come back to Connecticut after having been away for 13 years. It is a region where I believe God has led us in a variety of partnerships toward the all-consuming and critical work of advancing the call of Christ for this day and time. As I have said many times, ministry today is different than it was even a decade ago. What was important then may not be now. What is important now may make a difference in the life of our congregations down the road. And I will keep you all in my prayers as you make decisions about your future together with a new executive minister. May God continue to richly bless your ministry together in this wonderful region.

Cupcakes or Brownies for the Soup Kitchen


