TILBURY SEAFARERS CENTRE

The docks which used to be at the heart of East London have moved to Tilbury and DP World at Stanford-le-Hope. Did you know that over 90% of our imports, food and goods arrive by sea?

The Queen Victoria Seaman's Rest (QVSR) in East London, still offers accommodation for retired seafarers, but now most of its work with working Seafarers is at Tilbury and DP World Docks in Thurrock.

At present I am on an induction course for 'ship visiting' as part of the chaplaincy team at the Tilbury Centre which provides a warm welcome as ship's crews come ashore.

There is a continuing need for toiletry items and adult sized woolly hats and gloves. If you can help with supplying any of these items please let me know to arrange collection.

Many of the ship's crews are from the Philippines, Indonesia, China and Ukraine. Warm hats and gloves are essential for their well being whilst at sea for seven months plus at a time.

During December last year our Stanford Methodist Choir participated in the Christmas Carol Service at the Docks in the Seafarers Centre which was much appreciated.

NOISE REDUCTION IN TRINITY CHURCH HALL

Ever since we removed the stage and associated curtains as well as a set of blackout curtains some years ago there was a noticeable increase in the 'noisiness' of the room. This was particularly noticeable with a high number of people present including young people. It was much more difficult to make oneself heard and to hear others.

Advice was taken from a number of quarters but in particular from an Essex based company, B L Acoustics, who visited the site, undertook a survey and calculated the necessary quantity of sound absorbing panels needed to be installed to reduce the reverberation time from over 5 seconds to less than 2 seconds.

The cost of doing the work and the benefits for the church and community users was such that it was decided to apply for a grant from Veolia Environmental Trust. Fortunately, despite a rigorous application process, our project met the criteria for a grant and work was planned and undertaken in January this year. Because of a low level of asbestos content in our ceiling boards fixing to other surfaces in the hall was necessary. Consequently we have acoustic panels on the end wall of the church hall and along both sides at a level above windows and doors. The resulting improvement is obvious and very welcome especially for our family night meetings and on community cafe days.

The panels could not be cut to fit the angled roof line but can be used for display for lightweight items pinned to the fabric. The choice of colour was inevitably a compromise - lighter colours were not advised due to showing dirt over time. The final installation has generally been well received.
