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Rules and Regulations

Lodi Agricultural Fair Rules

BOARD OF DIRECTORS: President -Terry Quam, Vice President -Don Ness, Secretary – Lori Ripp, Treasurer - Nick Cable

RULES

- 1. The general supervision of the grounds and the entire exhibit is vested in the Fair President and Secretary.
- 2. Lodi Agricultural Fair, Inc. will not be liable for any accidents occurring on the Fairgrounds during the Fair. The grounds will be policed day and night and every precaution will be taken to preserve order and care for property.
- 3. Any affray or riotous proceedings or resistance to the regulations of the Fairgrounds will be visited by the severity of the law. The public is notified that the law gives the Fair Board full jurisdiction and control of the Fairgrounds. Attention is called to Section 4571 of the revised statutes, entitled "penalty for unlawful entry into Fairgrounds."
- 4. No persons except those having stock on exhibition, or those in the employ of the Fair will be allowed to remain on the grounds during the night without special permit from the Fair President or Secretary.
- 5. All animal exhibits will close at 4pm on Sunday.
- 6. The orders of the Fair President or Secretary will be executed by the Lodi Agricultural Fair, Inc. designated security, and it shall be their duty to see that order is preserved and that the daily program is carried out.
- 7. Persons desirous of special privileges not granted in the published regulations of the Fair must apply to the Fair Secretary, and all assistants in the various departments and laborers on the grounds must be employed by his consent and report to him daily the nature of their services the statement being certified by the superintendent in whose department the services may be performed.
- 8. The decision of the judges shall be final, except on proof of mistakes on the part of the judges in making their final report.

SUPERINTENDENTS

- 1. Livestock Superintendents must be in their departments from 8am to closing time during the Fair unless relieved by assistants. Junior and Open Class buildings are managed by the Superintendents.
- 2. Superintendents must see that all articles are tagged and properly arranged in their classes rendering the judges such assistance as may be needed.
- 3. Superintendents will not be relieved from duty until exhibits have been removed from their respective departments.



ENTRIES

All entries close June 22, 2023. Entries should be done using the Fair's Blue Ribbon Online Entry program accessed via our website: <u>www.lodiagfair.com</u>. Premium Books will not be printed. Fair Office personnel will be available to offer entry assistance during Office Hours as indicated on the front cover of this Premium Book. *No late entries will be accepted.*

- Premises IDs are REQUIRED for all livestock showing at the Fair. This includes dairy, beef, swine, sheep, goats, poultry and horses. Rabbits, dogs and cats do not require a Premises ID. No livestock will be admitted on to the Fairgrounds without a valid Premises ID on file with the Fair Office. If you have animals at more than one location, please provide Premises IDs for all locations. For more information on applying for a Premises ID, visit www.wiid.org.
- 2. All livestock exhibitors MUST be YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) Certified to exhibit at the Lodi Ag Fair. Exhibitor MUST be at least 8 years old and have completed the third grade to be eligible for YQCA Certification. If you do not meet these guidelines, you will not be allowed to exhibit at the Lodi Ag Fair. Go to https://yqca.learngrow.io/Account/Login for more information.
- 3. Barn set up time is Wednesday from 5pm to 8pm. After 8pm on Wednesday the barns will be closed until 2pm on Thursday.

Junior General and Open/Sr. Citizen exhibit drop off is Wednesday from 4pm to 8pm and Thursday from Noon to 6pm. Entry tags should be picked up from the fair office prior to exhibit drop-off.

Livestock exhibits: dairy, beef, swine, goats, poultry, rabbits and sheep are to be brought to the fairgrounds on Thursday between 2pm and 6pm. Market animal weigh-ins (beef, sheep, goats & swine) will be Thursday from 6:30pm to 8pm.

- 4. All large animals will enter the east entrance of fairgrounds off of North Hill Street. All exhibitors must stop at the vet check-in point before unloading animals.
- 5. All stall assignments will be determined by livestock committee at time of entry.
- 6. Exhibitors must reply to email verifying number of animals being exhibited. Failure to reply to email will result in animals being stalled on arrival to fairgrounds.
- 7. All market animals must be exhibited in the name of the bona fide owner and any violations of this rule will forfeit all premiums awarded.
- 8. Early release of livestock must be pre-approved. Submit written early release request to the Fair Office prior to June 22, 2023. Requests can be emailed to fairoffice@lodiagfair.com.
- 9. The association will take every precaution for the safe preservation of exhibits, but will not be held responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.



- 10. Only first prize winners can show for championship. No entry required.
- 11. While every effort will be made by the superintendent to correctly record the decisions of the judges, it is suggested that the exhibitor check the records at the completion of a breed showing livestock, and at the completion of each class in other departments.
- 12. Premium monies will be paid by check to individual exhibitors and delivered via US mail.
- 13. Exhibitor acknowledges the Premium Book lot descriptions will be used in judging not the abbreviated online entry lot descriptions.

PRE-EVENTJUDGING TIMES

Judging for the Style Revue (Dept 26J) and Demonstrations & Talks (Dept 31J) will be held before the Fair at 6:00pm on Wednesday July 5, 2023. All judging will take place at the fairgrounds in the Junior Exhibit Hall.

Subchapter I — General Requirements and Definitions

ATCP 160.01 **Definitions.** As used in this chapter:

(1) "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as holstein in the dairy class.

(2) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.

(2m) "Conference judging" means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.

(3) "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (b).

(4) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.

(5) "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.

(6) "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.

(7) "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.

(7e) "Face-to-face judging" means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:

(a) Get acquainted.

(b) Learn the background of the exhibit.

(c) Self-evaluation.

(d) Evaluator comment.

(e) Parting.

(7m) "Fair" means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. 93.23 (1) (b) or (c), Stats.

(7s) "Fair board" means the governing entity of a fair.

(8) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.

(9) "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.

(10) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.

(11) "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (c).

(12) "Self determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria:

(a) It is approved by the fair board.

(b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.

(c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.

(d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.

(13) "Youth organization" means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programing.

ATCP 160.02 **Premium requirements.** (1) GENERAL. (a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.

(b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair.

(c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.

(e) No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.

(f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) PREMIUM LISTS. (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).

(b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.

(c) Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) ENTRY FEES. (a) A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee or charge stall rents for animals, or both.

(b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES. (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.



(b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship.

(c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department:

1. Clothing revue.

2. Demonstrations.

3. Favorite foods revue.

4. Dogs.

4m. Cats.

5. Small animals.

6. Rocketry.

7. Shooting sports.

7m. Mechanical projects.

8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7.

(d) If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

ATCP 160.03 **Exhibition requirements.** A fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

(1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.

(2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.

(3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.49 (7).

(4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship

cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground.

ATCP 160.05 **Open division; general requirements.** (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class.

(2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

(3) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.

(4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.

(5) The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28.

ATCP 160.07 **Classes; general requirements. (1)** Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.

(2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.

(b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.

(3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.

(4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

(5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

ATCP 160.08 **Class definitions; individual classes.** (1) DAIRY CATTLE. (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

(b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.

(c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(h) A 2 year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

(i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

(j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

(2) BEEF CATTLE. (a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.

(b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A 2 year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.

(4) SWINE. (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A fair board may subdivide this entry class into January-born and February-born sows or boars.

(d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.

(5) SHEEP. (a) A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.

(b) A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.

(d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in pars. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.

ATCP 160.09 **Class definitions; group classes. (1)** DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE. (a) A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, or the summer yearling, bull and heifer classes, with both sexes to be represented.

(b) A dairy and beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. In either a dairy or beef breed get of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.

(c) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals of any age or sex which are the produce of one cow.

(d) A group of 3 best female cattle shall consist of 3 animals of any age which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

(2) SWINE. A pen of 3 feeder pigs shall consist of swine of either sex each weighing between 40 and 60 pounds. Any male pigs included in the pen shall be castrated and healed.

(3) SHEEP. (a) A get of sire shall consist of 4 lambs or yearlings, or both, of either sex, from one sire, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

(b) An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes and 2 ewe lambs which are owned by the exhibitor.

(c) A junior division pair of lambs may include a spring or fall ram and spring or fall ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor.

(d) A junior division flock shall be comprised of 3 sheep consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling ewe, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

Subchapter V — Judging and Accounting

ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations. (1) Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.

(1m) (a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.



(b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year.

(c) A fair representative may request the department waive par.(b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.

(2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.

(3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.

(4) (a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division.

(b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.

(c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

(4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.

(5) If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

ATCP 160.92 **Accounting requirements.** (1) All receipts from any source whatsoever shall be deposited in a bank, and all accounts without exception shall be paid by check or draft. All records, including judging sheets, papers, stubs, checks, vouchers or other orders relating to fair transactions shall be preserved for a 6-year period subsequent to the year in which they were made or issued.

(2) Premiums shall be actually paid or bona fide notice of premium awards sent to all premium winners before a claim for state aid may be considered.

(3) The authorized fair representative claiming state aid shall file with the department within 30 days after the close of the fair, an affidavit which shall include all of the following documents:

(a) A list of premiums actually paid or to be paid listed by department.

(b) An index of exhibitors and their addresses, with amounts paid in premiums opposite each name.

(c) One premium book.

(d) A summary of all judges utilized by the fair including their registration numbers.

(e) An affidavit from each judge indicating the departments and classes judged at the fair.

(f) Horse exhibitors' registrations.

(4) The authorized fair representative shall submit, on or before January 31 following the year in which the fair is held, the annual financial report verified on oath which shall include the receipts and disbursements, and the fair attendance. State aid received for the current year shall be included as a receipt in the annual financial report.

Animal Health Regulations Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2023 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so always check **datcp.wi.gov** or contact us for current information. Fairs or exhibitions may have additional requirements. Exhibitors should contact the event organizers for more information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code.

All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required
records and test results:
Exhibitor's name and address
 Animal identification (number, type, description, and, when required, official identification (see requirements for different animals below))
 Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
 Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
 Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when required, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below)
For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment
 For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment
Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.
Note: Except in specific circumstances, if an animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead, the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)
These regulations apply to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.
Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.08(1), Wis. Admin. Code)
Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

JUNIOR CLASSES - DANISH JUDGING

All exhibitors in the Junior Fair division shall be a member of an organized youth organization under adult supervision.

- 1. **Premises IDs are REQUIRED** for all livestock showing at the Fair. This includes dairy, beef, swine, sheep, goats, poultry and horses. Rabbits, dogs and cats do not require a Premises ID. No livestock will be admitted on to the Fairgrounds without a valid Premises ID on file with the Fair Office. If you have animals at more than one location, please provide Premises IDs for all locations. For more information on applying for a Premises ID, visit www.wiid.org.
- 2. All showmanship entries must show their own animal which has been shown at this year's fair.
- 3. Entry Day for all livestock (Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goats, Poultry and Rabbits) is Thursday from 2pm to 6pm. All exhibitors must bring their own animal to the designated area for inspection and check-in. Fair Tags will NOT be printed for livestock entries except Dept 7 Poultry and Dept 8 Rabbits.
- 4. Barn set up time is Wednesday from 5pm to 8pm. After 8pm on Wednesday the barns will be closed until 2pm Thursday. Only 12-gauge extension cords should be used in the livestock barns.
- 5. All other exhibits entry time: Wednesday from 4pm to 8pm and Thursday from Noon to 6pm.
- 6. Judging starts Thursday evening at 5pm with the Dog Show.
- 7. Exhibits may not be removed from the fairgrounds before 4pm on Sunday. Violators will forfeit premiums.
- Early release of livestock must be pre-approved. Submit written request prior to entry deadline of June
 Requests can be emailed to fairoffice@lodiagfair.com.
- 9. All exhibits must be removed from the Fairgrounds between 4pm-6pm Sunday of the Fair unless other arrangements are made with the superintendent prior to the show.
- 10. Exhibitors of livestock are responsible for cleaning of stalls and their exhibit area prior to departure on Sunday.
- 11. Exhibitors in Junior Departments must be between ages of 8-20 years as of January 1st of current Fair year.
- 12. Livestock show questions will be addressed by the livestock committee. All committee decisions are final.
- 13. Livestock exhibitors must have all required forms filled out completely and turned into appropriate superintendent before they will be allowed to exhibit their project(s).
- 14. Anyone showing or presenting ribbons or awards for any of the livestock shows must be at least 8 years old as of January 1st of the current fair year.

In order to accommodate proper stalling space, the Lodi Agricultural Fair Board of Directors and Livestock Committee reserve the right to limit each exhibitor's number of animal entries for any or all species beyond what is printed in the current Lodi Ag Fair premium book. All decisions regarding this matter made by this fair's livestock committee or board of directors are final.

Livestock Exhibitors must verify number of animals needing stalls on or before June 22, by replying to the stalling request email from <u>fairoffice@lodiagfair.com</u>. Exhibitor email addresses from the exhibitor's Blue Ribbon Online Entry account will be used. Note: Failure to respond will delay stalling of animal exhibits.




YQCA FOR ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

The Lodi Agricultural Fair requires YQCA certification for youth who are exhibiting ALL LIVESTOCK at our fair. Your YQCA certificate number is input during your online fair account creation. ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS must be prepared to provide a copy or a digital image of the YQCA certificate upon request of a livestock superintendent.

As Wisconsin continues to promote Food Safety in all areas of our fairs, the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) national program was implemented. YQCA was created for youth in the Beef, Dairy, Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine projects. This program provides families more flexibility in acquiring this much needed information which trains youth in improving the care of food animals and promoting a higher level of consumer food safety. The livestock industry and businesses are constantly striving for high quality, wholesome products; therefore, youth in food animal projects should assist in this effort.





LODI AGRICULTURAL FAIR CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

(adapted from IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics)

Exhibitors at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example.

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered and shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians as required by the Wisconsin Department of Trade and Consumer Protection website. <u>https://datcp.wi.gov/Documents/FairRulesAnimals.pdf</u>

2. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair or livestock shows.

3. Animals and animal pens and animal areas are to be kept clean and free of trash. Bedding is to be disposed of in provided manure spreaders. All pens must be completely cleaned out at the end of the fair.

4. Animals that may enter the food chain will be free of volatile drug residues. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state regulations and rules.

5. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event even if in accordance with federal and state statutes, regulations and rules.

6. At any time after an animal arrives on the fairgrounds, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian or as prescribed in writing by a licensed veterinarian.

7. An animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means. Altering of an animal's appearance will be considered unethical fitting. Unethical fitting shall include, but not limited to:

- > The use of clenbuterol.
- Any surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g. administration of fluid via stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen).
- > Any attempt to change the degree of firmness (e.g. icing of animals).
- > Any attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development.



Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally with an irritant or counter-irr itant, substances used to artificially enhance or change the conformation of the udder, use of any device to create or enhance the udder crease or plugging of the teat canal.

8. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals causing swelling or use of excessive force to brace or control an animal, using electrical devices, or other similar practices are unacceptable and are prohibited.

9. All exhibitors and their families must be respectful to others. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair board members, superintendents, volunteers, other exhibitors, or fair visitors before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. All judges, fair board members and show superintendents, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

All exhibitors, the immediate family and any other parties involved in the unethical fitting and/or showing of an animal may be subject to penalties as described below:

- forfeiture of award(s) and premium(s)
- forfeiture of auction proceeds
- barred immediately from competition in the department in which the violation has occurred and/or from all departments entered
- dismissal from the fairgrounds
- barred from future competition in the Lodi Agricultural Fair.

RULES AND CHECK IN PROCEDURES FOR LODI AGRICULTURAL FAIR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

- Please refer to the DATCP website page <u>https://datcp.wi.gov/Documents/FairRulesAnimals.pdf</u> for ALL Livestock testing required before our fair! All animal health papers must be signed by your veterinarian and the required specific testing is completed before animals will be allowed to unload at the fairgrounds.
- 2. All livestock MUST be identified with a PERMANENT ID (eartag, tattoo or leg band). Poultry must have a Leg Band. Tattoos must be legible on Rabbits. All other livestock must have RFID numbers or Eartags, no ear notches will be accepted. This ID must be unique to the exhibitor and animal. There will be no swapping of ID between family members. No Eartag Substitutions will be allowed for market animals after the fair entry deadline. This identification must match that used on the Lodi Ag Fair online entry form.
- 3. All exhibitors must provide a valid Premises ID number when entering any livestock exhibits. This includes: dairy, beef, swine, sheep, goats, poultry, and horses. Rabbit exhibits do not require a Premises ID. Failure to provide a Premises ID will void all of the exhibitor's livestock entries.
- 4. The Lodi Agricultural Fair requires YQCA certification for ALL LIVESTOCK. Exhibitors must be prepared to provide a copy or a digital image of the YQCA certificate upon request of livestock superintendent.
- 5. Check in times is from 2-6PM, on Thursday. All trailers/exhibitors need to enter the fairgrounds at the back entrance off of Hill View St, forming a line for check in. DO NOT STALL ANIMALS UNTIL THEY ARE CHECKED IN.
- 6. All livestock (swine, cattle, goats & sheep) will be examined and checked in on the trailer. No animals are to be unloaded until permission is given from fair staff.
- 7. Our Swine Show is non-terminal. A copy of your veterinarian cleared health papers will be required to be turned into the Swine Superintendent before your pigs will be assigned pens. DO NOT stall until given a pen number.
- 8. Sheep must have blankets, tubes, leg wraps, etc. off at check in.

9. <u>MANDATORY - ALL Livestock Exhibitors Meeting</u> (parents/guardians included) will be held on <u>Thursday evening at 6:30 pm</u> in the Indoor Show Arena. Parking passes will be issued at this meeting.

- 10. Any health issues with livestock on exhibit must be reported to the superintendent/fair office. A veterinarian will be contacted by LAF.
- 11. Exhibitors are to be present when their market animals are loaded out on Sunday. This is scheduled to start at 2pm for all sale animals. All other animals will be released at 4pm. It is suggested you be present by 10am on Sunday until your animal has left the fair grounds.



MEAT ANIMAL SALE RULES & REGULATIONS

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To provide incentive and to encourage participation in livestock feeding projects.
- 2. To provide 4-H and FFA junior and senior members, Girl Scout and Boy Scout members and any other junior organized organization, a market opportunity to have their market livestock projects sold.

PROCEDURES:

- Premises IDs are REQUIRED for all livestock showing at the Fair. This includes dairy, beef, swine, sheep, goats, poultry and horses. Rabbits, dogs and cats do not require a Premises ID. No livestock will be admitted on to the Fairgrounds without a valid Premises ID on file with the Fair Office. If you have animals at more than one location, please provide Premises IDs for all locations. For more information on applying for a Premises ID, visit www.wiid.org.
- Meat animal sale limited to junior exhibitors ages 8-20 as of January 1st of the fair year. Animals must be carried as a project. The Lodi Agricultural Fair is requiring YQCA certification for ALL LIVESTOCK. ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS must be prepared to provide a copy or a digital image of the YQCA certificate upon request of livestock superintendent.
- 3. Exhibitors with animals in the sale will be required to sign a slip stating proper withdrawal times have been observed for any drugs used, to be turned in at the time of meat animal weigh-in.
- 4. All class winners must show for champion and reserve of their species.
- 5. Exhibitors must be present to weigh in AND load out market animals.
- 6. ** <u>MANDATORY**ALL Livestock Exhibitors Meeting</u> (parents/guardians included) will be held on <u>Thursday evening at 6:30 pm</u> in the Indoor Show Arena. Weigh-ins will follow this meeting. Weigh-in order for large species:

Market Lambs/Goats Market Hogs Market Beef

All livestock sold at the sale on Saturday will not become the possession or the responsibility of the buyer until release time of the fair. Consignor is responsible to feed and care for animals until release time and must check with purchaser on arrangements of caring for animals until purchaser takes delivery. Consignor is responsible for reporting arrangements of animal to superintendent or fair office. CONSIGNOR WILL FURNISH A HALTER TO THE BUYER. A \$5.00 premium reduction will be taken if suitable rope halter is not provided to the buyer.

It is the consignor's responsibility to make arrangements with the buyer for animal removal on Sunday. The Exhibitor must be on hand starting at 2pm to load their sale animal unless approved by sale committee member. Violation of any stated rule or regulation will result in the exhibitor being ineligible for future meat sales. Only licensed meat plants or poultry processors should be used.

Sale rules have been established by the meat animal sale committee as follows:

- 1. Sale will consist of a maximum of 15 each of Market beef, lambs, and hogs, as well as the top two eligible market goats and the small animals listed below.
- 2. Exhibitors allowed only one animal to be selected for sale.



- 3. All sale animals will be determined by the official judge of the day.
- 4. All decisions of the meat animal sale committee are final.
- 5. In the event that any meat animal tests positive for any form of drug residue used either legally or illegally, the ownership of the sale animal will revert back to the exhibitor and sale monies will be forfeited and returned to the buyer.
- 6. Sale order will be on species rotation.
- 7. Sale animals will be released at 2pm on Sunday.
- 8. TRUCKER CANNOT PICK UP SALE ANIMALS WITH OUT PURCHASE RECEIPT FROM THE BUYER.
- 9. Sale commission will be 5% of selling price. 1.5% will be used for sales promotion, buyer recognition and provide liability insurance coverage. The remaining 3.5% will go into the Lodi Agricultural Fair Scholarship Fund.

Small Animal Rules:

The following animals will be selected by official judge for eligibility in the meat sale. All animals shown as pens will sell as 1 lot.

- a. Rabbits
 - 1. Meat pen
 - 2. Single fryer
 - 3. Roaster rabbit
- b. Chickens
 - 1. Roaster pen, 2 birds
 - 2. Broiler pen, 2 birds
- c. Ducks
 - 1. Best overall meat bird
- d. Geese
 - 1. Best overall meat bird
- e. Turkeys
 - 1. Best overall meat bird.

Neither the fair nor the sale committee will make a guarantee as to sale price. It is the responsibility of members to bring in prospective buyers for their own animals.

Dairy Exhibitor Guidelines to participate in Meat Animal Sale

- Premises IDs are REQUIRED for all livestock showing at the Fair. This includes dairy, beef, swine, sheep, goats, poultry and horses. Rabbits, dogs and cats do not require a Premises ID. No livestock will be admitted on to the Fairgrounds without a valid Premises ID on file with the Fair Office. If you have animals at more than one location, please provide Premises IDs for all locations. For more information on applying for a Premises ID, visit <u>www.wiid.org</u>.
- Each fair animal must have their own unique ID number. There will <u>not</u> be any changing of dairy animals into different lots. (Example no spring heifer changed to a fall heifer, if the original animal gets sick...it must be spring heifer to spring heifer.) If this change is done after the Lodi Ag Fair On-Line entry deadline of June 22, 2023, you will not be eligible for competing to sell a Dairy basket at the Meat/Animal sale.
- 3. Exhibitors are required to be present for auction and present animal to buyers
- 4. Exhibitors will be charged for dairy basket to be awarded to buyer. Amount will be deducted from sale check.
- 5. If selected for the Meat Animal Sale, dairy exhibitors are allowed to sell one animal/basket. Exception only for an exhibitor with multiple champions.
- 6. Dairy representatives for the meat animal sale will be the overall Champion and Reserve Champion of the Junior Division (calves and heifers) and the overall Champion and Reserve Champion of the Senior Division (cows).

- VI. Exhibitors shall dress appropriately for showing, no open toed shoes or shoes that slip off easily.
- VII. Any dog showing aggression may be excused.
- VIII. No female dogs in season will be allowed.
- IX. No dogs shall be left unattended, even if crated.
- X. Dogs must be on leash at all times outside of the show ring.
- XI. No wolf or wolf cross dogs will be allowed.
- XII. If an exhibitor has received a qualifying score of 170 or better the previous year with the same dog, they must move up one class.
- XIII. This is an outside show on grass, under a tent, no mats in show ring.
- XIV. Dog show will start at 5:00pm on Thursday.

JUDGING ORDER IS SET BY JUDGE THE DAY OF THE SHOW!!

Class expectations are as follow:

- **Beginner Pre-Novice:** This *class is for the 1st year handler and dog with no prior training experience*. Must perform: heel, figure 8, sit for exam, recall (no finish) and 45 second sit/stay. All exercise on leash.
- **Pre-Novice A**: *This class is for handler and dogs who have never competed before at a show at this level.* Must perform: heel, figure 8 heel, stand for exam, recall with finish, 1 minute sit-stay and 1 minute down stay. All exercises on leash.
- **Pre-Novice B**: This class is for handler and /or dog that has shown at the Pre-Novice level but have not yet received a qualifying score. Must perform: heel, figure 8 heel, stand for exam, recall with finish, 1 minute sit-stay and 1 minute down stay. All exercises on leash.
- Novice: This class is for handler and /or dog that has shown at the Pre-Novice level and received a qualifying score. Must perform: heel on leash, figure 8 on leash, stand for exam off leash, heel off leash, recall with finish off leash, 1 minute sit-stay on leash and 1 minute down-stay on leash.



- Graduate Novice: This class is for handler and/or dog that has shown at the Novice level and received a qualifying score. Must perform: heel on leash, (the following are all performed off leash): stand for exam, heal free, figure 8 heel, recall with drop and finish, 2 minute sit-stay with handler in sight (leash dropped by dog), 3 minute down-stay with handler in sight (leash dropped by dog).
- **Pre-Open** *This class is for handler and/or dog that has shown at the Graduate Novice level and received a qualifying score.* Must perform: All exercises off leash, exhibitor must provide own dumbbell to be approved by judge: heel free, figure 8 heel, recall with drop and finish, retrieve dumbbell on flat, recall over Broad jump, 3 minute sit-stay with handler in sight, 5 minute down-stay with handler in sight.
- **Brace:** The Brace class is for two dogs (recommended, but not required, to be of similar height) that are capable of performing exercises in unison with one handler. One or both dogs must be trained by the handler, one dog may be borrowed/leased by the handler. Dogs may be shown with two separate leashes or coupled (recommended-the coupling device will not be less than 6" in length overall). Whichever leash method is used will be continued throughout all exercises. Dogs will be judged as one unit. All vaccines/show requirements are required for both dogs.
- **Pre-Novice Brace:** One dog must be working at Pre-Novice Obedience level and the second dog may be Pre-Novice or higher Obedience level. Same class expectations as Pre-Novice Obedience.



Little Britches Fun Class General Rules

Little Britches is a non-competitive, just-for-fun educational class for the 5–8-year-old children who are too young to show in the regular Dairy, Beef, Rabbit and Poultry competitive show classes. This is also a great mentoring opportunity for Jr. and Sr. Exhibitors at the Lodi Agricultural Fair. Each Little Britches Fun Class will be held after the regular classes are finished competing in the same locations, thus, Poultry & Rabbits will be in the small animal tent and Dairy/Beef in the outdoor showring, unless directed to a different location.

Little Britches Participant Rules:

- Registration for the Little Britches youth must be completed on-line through the Lodi Agricultural Fair website at <u>www.LodiAgFair.com</u> and follow the rules for all livestock exhibitors. This includes any testing required prior to the Lodi Fair. The on-line entry deadline is June 22ndst of the current fair year. No late entries will be accepted. Livestock Premise ID and ear tags/leg bands for identification purposes will be required as per WI State rules. (The mentor will be able to supply this info for you).

 - b. Enter: Dept 607 Class: A Lot: 1 Showmanship Little Britches Clucks N Ducks
 - c. Enter: Dept 608 Class: A Lot: 1 Showmanship Little Britches Hoppers
 - d. Please call the fair office if you need assistance 608-592-4499 or stop in by the Fair Office. Fair Office hours: Tues and Thurs eves 6pm-8pm and Saturday morning 10am-Noon during the month of June.
- 2. The youth must be mentored by one of the following: by a current Lodi Fair exhibitor, a former Lodi Fair exhibitor or an adult familiar with the animal. If the mentor is not a current Lodi Fair exhibitor, the Little Britches Committee will pair up the youth and mentor with an exhibiting club/group, so the animal will be stalled or housed near them for additional support.
- 3. The youth must be between 5-8 years of age as of January 1st of the current fair year and who are not eligible to exhibit in Jr. Livestock Classes.
- 4. Parent/guardians must complete and sign a waiver form AND email the form to the fair office at fairoffice@lodiagfair.com. Please bring a copy or have a photo on your phone the day of the show just in case it wasn't received by the fair office; a copy may be requested by the Little Britches show manager before the child enters the showring.
- 5. The parent/guardian **MUST** be present at both the time of mentoring and show time.
- 6. The fair emcee will have a microphone and will ask the child questions regarding the animal. Questions that may be asked could be: breed, age, name of the animal, what it eats, how it is taken care of, who owns it, etc.

Jr./Sr. Exhibitor Mentors Rules:

- 1. The Little Britches Mentor must be one of the following: a current Lodi Fair exhibitor, a former Lodi Fair exhibitor or an adult familiar with the animal in one of these species departments: Dairy, Beef, Rabbits or Poultry.
- 2. The animal must be housed on the fairgrounds during the entire fair with an appointed exhibiting club/group at the Lodi Fair. The Little Britches committee will pair up the youth and mentor for the animal to be stalled or housed near them for additional support.



- 3. At all times, the Mentor is to keep safety in mind and **NEVER** leave the Little Britches participant alone or unsupervised with the animal.
- 4. Animals must be healthy, clean and ready for exhibition like any other fair project animal and cared for every day of the fair.
- 5. ALL the mentoring will be done under the supervision of the child's parent/guardian.
- 6. Each mentor will spend at least 15 to 30 minutes teaching his/her "Little Britches" participant about the care of the animal and will be present when the animal is presented to the Fair emcee or fair official. Keeping the animal secure but not interfering with the showing of the animal.
- 7. Calves must be born on or after March 1, 2023, nothing older.
- 8. The Jr./Sr. Exhibitor mentor will complete and sign a participation mentor form along with their parent/guardian signature.
- 9. This is a general class, so there will not be a division of the class by breed, animal age or child's age. It will just be a group lined up.
- 10. For those Jr or Senior exhibitors who mentor through this Little Britches Exhibition, this is an educational extension of the species project and will be credited as a part of your volunteerism qualification for the Lodi Agricultural Fair Livestock Scholarship available for graduating high school seniors.



DEPARTMENT 109 DOG OBEDIENCE

Superintendent: Maureen Heider 608- 515-9242

- I. Only one dog per class may be entered by each exhibitor. No dog may be entered by two or more exhibitors in the same class.
- II. Exhibitors entered in the Jr. Dept. may not enter the same dog in the Open Dept.
- III. Each exhibitor must have trained the dog they are showing.
- IV. All dogs are required to have had Rabies vaccine, Distemper, Hepatitis, Leptopsirosis, Parainfluena and Parvovirius (DHLPP) vaccine given. Certificates of proof of these vaccines shall be mailed to the Lodi Ag Fair, Box 302, Lodi, WI 53555 by entry deadline. Failure to present certification will result in disqualification. Bordetella vaccine (kennel cough) is strongly recommended.
- V. Exhibitors must clean up after their dogs. Baggies WILL NOT be provided.
- VI. Exhibitors shall dress appropriately for showing, no open toed shoes or shoes that slip off easily.
- VII. Any dog showing aggression may be excused.
- VIII. No female dogs in season will be allowed.
 - IX. No dogs shall be left unattended, even if crated.
 - X. Dogs must be on leash at all times outside of the show ring.
- XI. No wolf or wolf cross dogs will be allowed.
- XII. If an exhibitor has received a qualifying score of 170 or better the previous year with the same dog, they must move up one class.
- XIII. This is an outside show on grass, under a tent, no mats in show ring.
- XIV. Dog show will start at 5:00pm on Thursday.

JUDGING ORDER IS SET BY JUDGE THE DAY OF THE SHOW!!

Class expectations are as follow:

- **Beginner Pre-Novice:** This *class is for the 1st year handler and dog with no prior training experience*. Must perform: heel, figure 8, sit for exam, recall (no finish) and 45 second sit/stay. All exercise on leash.
- **Pre-Novice A**: *This class is for handler and dogs who have never competed before at a show at this level.* Must perform: heel, figure 8 heel, stand for exam, recall with finish, 1 minute sit-stay and 1 minute down stay. All exercises on leash.
- **Pre-Novice B**: This class is for handler and /or dog that has shown at the Pre-Novice level but have not yet received a qualifying score.



Must perform: heel, figure 8 heel, stand for exam, recall with finish, 1 minute sit-stay and 1 minute down stay. All exercises on leash.

- Novice: This class is for handler and /or dog that has shown at the Pre-Novice level and received a qualifying score. Must perform: heel on leash, figure 8 on leash, stand for exam off leash, heel off leash, recall with finish off lease, 1 minute sit-stay on leash and 1 minute down-stay on leash.
- **Graduate Novice**: *This class is for handler and/or dog that has shown at the Novice level and received a qualifying score.* Must perform: heel on leash, (the following are all performed off leash): stand for exam, heal free, figure 8 heel, recall with drop and finish, 2 minute sit-stay with handler in sight (leash dropped by dog), 3 minute down-stay with handler in sight (leash dropped by dog).
- **Pre-Open:** This class is for handler and/or dog that has shown at the Graduate Novice level and received a qualifying score. Must perform: All exercises off leash, exhibitor must provide own dumbbell to be approved by judge: heel free, figure 8 heel, recall with drop and finish, retrieve dumbbell on flat, recall over Broad jump, 3 minute sit-stay with handler in sight, 5 minute down-stay with handler in sight.
- **Brace:** The Brace class is for two dogs (recommended, but not required, to be of similar height) that are capable of performing exercises in unison with one handler. One or both dogs must be trained by the handler, one dog may be borrowed/leased by the handler. Dogs may be shown with two separate leashes or coupled (recommended-the coupling device will not be less than 6" in length overall). Whichever leash method is used will be continued throughout all exercises. Dogs will be judged as one unit. All vaccines/show requirements are required for both dogs.
- **Pre-Novice Brace**: One dog must be working at Pre-Novice Obedience level and the second dog may be Pre-Novice or higher Obedience level. Same class expectations as Pre-Novice Obedience.
- **Novice Brace:** Both dogs must be at Novice Obedience level or higher. Same class expectations as Novice Obedience.



QUILTING

Definition of Quilting: 3 or more layers of fabric sewn or tied together.

- I. Only one entry per lot number/per class, per person is allowed.
- II. Entry must be the work of the exhibitor (except as noted) and made in the last two years.
- III. Non-Professional quilting only. Exhibitor must earn less than half of his/her income from quilting.
- IV. The entry committee reserves the right to change the lot on an item if necessary.Reasonable attempts will be made to contact the maker if an item is re-categorized.
- V. All quilts in Classes H X **MUST have a 4-inch rod pocket no more than 84" from bottom of piece to top of pocket for hanging (may be pinned or sewn on).** If quilt is submitted without a rod pocket the quilt will automatically be judged one (1) ribbon placing lower.
- VI. Quilted clothing items should be entered in Department 126 Clothing.
- VII. Exhibits must be free of pet hair, smoke, etc. or they will not be accepted for judging/display.
