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## **Rules and Regulations**

## Lodi Agricultural Fair Rules

**BOARD OF DIRECTORS:** President - Terry Quam, Vice President - Don Ness, Secretary – Lori Ripp, Treasurer - Nick Cable

#### RULES

- 1. The general supervision of the grounds and the entire exhibit is vested in the Fair President and Secretary.
- 2. Lodi Agricultural Fair, Inc. will not be liable for any accidents occurring on the Fairgrounds during the Fair. The grounds will be policed day and night and every precaution will be taken to preserve order and care for property.
- 3. Any affray or riotous proceedings or resistance to the regulations of the Fairgrounds will be visited by the severity of the law. The public is notified that the law gives the Fair Board full jurisdiction and control of the Fairgrounds. Attention is called to Section 4571 of the revised statutes, entitled "penalty for unlawful entry into Fairgrounds."
- 4. No persons except those having stock on exhibition, or those in the employ of the Fair will be allowed to remain on the grounds during the night without special permit from the Fair President or Secretary.
- 5. All animal exhibits will close at 4pm on Sunday.
- 6. The orders of the Fair President or Secretary will be executed by the Lodi Agricultural Fair, Inc. designated security, and it shall be their duty to see that order is preserved and that the daily program is carried out.
- 7. Persons desirous of special privileges not granted in the published regulations of the Fair must apply to the Fair Secretary, and all assistants in the various departments and laborers on the grounds must be employed by his consent and report to him daily the nature of their services the statement being certified by the superintendent in whose department the services may be performed.
- 8. The decision of the judges shall be final, except on proof of mistakes on the part of the judges in making their final report.

#### SUPERINTENDENTS

- 1. Superintendents must be in their departments from 8am to closing time during the Fair unless relieved by assistants.
- 2. Superintendents must see that all articles are tagged and properly arranged in their classes rendering the judges such assistance as may be needed.
- 3. Superintendents will not be relieved from duty until exhibits have been removed from their respective departments.



#### ENTRIES

All entries close Saturday, June 22, 2019. Entries should be done using the Fair's Blue Ribbon Online Entry program accessed via our website: <u>www.lodiagfair.com</u>. Premium Books will not be printed. All Premium Book information can be found on our website at <u>www.lodiagfair.com</u>. Reference Premium Books and Entry Worksheets, however, are located at the Lodi Library and the Poynette Library. Fair Office personnel will be available to offer entry assistance during Office Hours as indicated on the front cover of this Premium Book. *No late entries will be accepted*.

- 1. **Premises IDs are REQUIRED** for all livestock showing at the Fair. This includes dairy, beef, swine, sheep, poultry and horses. Rabbits, dogs and cats do not require a Premises ID. No livestock will be admitted on to the Fairgrounds without a valid Premises ID on file with the Fair Office. If you have animals at more than one location, please provide Premises IDs for all locations. For more information on applying for a Premises ID, visit <u>www.wiid.org</u>.
- All livestock exhibitors MUST be YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) Certified to exhibit at the Lodi Ag Fair. Exhibitor MUST be at least 8 years old and have completed the third grade to be eligible for YQCA Certification. If you do not meet these guidelines, you will not be allowed to exhibit at the Lodi Ag Fair. Go to <u>https://yqca.learngrow.io/Account/Login</u> for more information.
- 3. Barn set up time is Wednesday from 5pm to 8pm. After 8pm on Wednesday the barns will be closed until 2pm on Thursday.

Junior General and Open/Sr. Citizen exhibit drop off is Wednesday from 4pm to 8pm and Thursday from Noon to 6pm. Entry tags should be picked up from the fair office prior to exhibit drop-off.

Livestock exhibits: dairy, beef, swine, poultry, rabbits and sheep are to be brought to the fairgrounds on Thursday between 2pm and 6pm. Market animal weigh-ins (beef, sheep & swine) will be Thursday from 6:30pm to 8pm.

- 4. All large animals will enter the east entrance of fairgrounds off of North Hill Street. All exhibitors must stop at the vet check-in point before unloading animals.
- 5. All stall assignments will be determined by livestock committee at time of entry.
- 6. Exhibitors must reply to email verifying number of animals being exhibited. Failure to reply to email will result in animals being stalled on arrival to fairgrounds.
- 7. All market animals must be exhibited in the name of the bona fide owner and any violations of this rule will forfeit all premiums awarded.
- 8. Early release of livestock must be pre-approved. Submit written early release request to the Fair Office prior to June 22, 2019. Requests can be emailed to secretary@lodiagfair.com.



- 9. The association will take every precaution for the safe preservation of exhibits, but will not be held responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.
- 10. Only first prize winners can show for championship. No entry required.
- 11. While every effort will be made by the superintendent to correctly record the decisions of the judges, it is suggested that the exhibitor check the records at the completion of a breed showing livestock, and at the completion of each class in other departments.
- 12. Premium monies will be paid by check to individual exhibitors and delivered via US mail.
- 13. Exhibitor acknowledges the Premium Book lot descriptions will be used in judging not the abbreviated online entry lot descriptions.

#### **PRE-EVENT JUDGING TIMES**

Judging for the Style Revue (Dept 26J) and Demonstrations & Talks (Dept 31J) will be held before the Fair at 6:00pm on Tuesday July 9, 2019. All judging will take place at the fairgrounds in the Junior Exhibit Hall.

#### **COUNTY AND DISTRICT FAIRS**

#### **Chapter ATCP 160**

#### **Subchapter I - General Requirements and Definitions ATCP 160.01 Definitions.** As used in this chapter:

(1) "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as holstein in the dairy class.

(2) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits: a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
(3) "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91
(4) (b).

(4) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
(5) "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is

limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division. (6) "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.

(7) Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.

(8) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a local fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.

(9) Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the breed class that can be sold for slaughter.

(10) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a county or district fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.

(11) "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (c).

(12) "Self determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria: (a) It is approved by the fair board. (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29. (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department. (d) It is carried out by a 4–H member enrolled in a designated 4–H project or alternative project that follows 4–H guidelines, or by a member of another youth organization that does equivalent work.

#### ATCP 160.02 Premium requirements (1) GENERAL.

(a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a county or district fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
(b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify action taken by a local fair.
(c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the

organization or for any other reason. (d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.

(e) No county or district fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same county or district fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.

(f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests

(2) **PREMIUM LISTS.** (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net

premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).

(b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.(c) Sections ATCP 160.01through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) ENTRY FEES. (a) A county or district fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee. The entry fee may not exceed 10% of the sum of all premiums offered to exhibitors in the same class for which the entry fee is charged. In lieu of an entry fee, a county or district fair may charge stall rents for horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, rabbits or pets. (b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor is season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES. (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.

(b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split fair dates only if the fair organization justifies the split dates based on extreme hardship. If the department approves split dates, all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit (c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates, regardless of whether the department approves those split dates in advance:

Clothing revue. 2. Demonstrations. 3. Favorite foods revue. 4. Dogs.
 Small animals. 6. Rocketry. 7. Shooting sports. 8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1.to 7.

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements. A county or district fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

(1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a county or district fair shall require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor shall the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society. (2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.

(3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.04 (8).

(4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fair grounds before 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animals on the grounds.

ATCP 160.04 Junior fair division; general. (1) In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are under 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year. A county or district fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor's grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.

(2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of 4–H, FFA, a scouting program, a breed group, or another recognized youth organization under adult leadership that has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the fair board.

(3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor's own labor. An exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves the project, skill area, or supervised occupational experience as an exhibit.
(4) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to any exhibitor in any department in the junior fair division, except that:
(a) A premium may be awarded to each member of a group that collectively owns and enters a livestock exhibit in departments one to 5 of subch. IV.
(b) An exhibitor may receive a separate premium for showmanship where authorized under subch. IV.

(c) An exhibitor may receive more than one premium in a department for which additional premiums are specifically authorized under subch. IV. (5) Under subch. IV, within each of the junior fair departments 9,10, 13 to 16, 18, and 20 to 29, a fair board may establish one or more entry classes for self-determined projects that are related to that department. The fair board may establish class entry criteria, including student grade level criteria. Entry classes are open to 4–H members enrolled in a designated 4–H project or an alternative project that follows 4–H project guidelines, and to members of other youth organizations that do equivalent work and apply equivalent guidelines. Exhibits may be judged using the regular or Danish judging system. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first–place to fourth–place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the board:

(a) Premium level one: \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25.

(b) Premium level 2: \$2.50, \$2.25, \$2.00, \$1.75.
(c) Premium level 3: \$3.00, \$2.75, \$2.50, \$2.25.

(6) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.

(7) Special educational exhibits may [be] established if the proposal is presented to the Wisconsin association of fairs before October1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.

(8) Within any junior fair department under subch. IV, a county or district fair may establish special classes where none are specified under subch. IV. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under subch. IV.

#### ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.

(1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for last place in the class.

(2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

#### ATCP 160.06 Senior citizens division; general requirements

(1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.

(2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division. History. Cr. Register, November 1990, No. 419, eff. 12-1-90.

#### ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements

(1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.

(2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no county or district fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered purebreds. Registered purebred status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration. (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a county or district fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.

(3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.

(4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

(5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair. History: Cr. Register, November, 1990, No. 419, eff. 12–1–90; renum. and am.(2) to be

#### ATCP 160.08 Class definitions: individual classes

(1) DAIRY CATTLE. (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

(b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.(c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and

November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(h) A 2 year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

(i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

(j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

(2)BEEF CATTLE.

(a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.

(b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A 2 year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.(4) SWINE.

(a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A local fair board may subdivide this entry class into January–born and February–born sows or boars.

(d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.

(5) SHEEP.

(a) A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.(b) A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.

(d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in pars. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.

ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations. (1) Judging shall be done at county and district fairs by individuals who are registered with the department and who have knowledge, training or experience in the specific class or classes to be judged as determined by the department. Judging shall be done in accordance With the requirements of s. ATCP 160.92(3) (a). In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department. (2) Each judge at a county or district fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.

(3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
(4) (a) No state aid will be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any classes except in the junior and educational departments.
(b)When classes in the junior and educational departments are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 75% in the first 3 groups.

(c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

(5) If any class of exhibits at a county or district fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class. # Animal Health Regulations for Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2019 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions only. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so you should always check our website or contact us for current information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code

- Early release of livestock must be pre-approved. Submit written request prior to entry deadline of June
   Requests can be emailed to secretary@lodiagfair.com.
- 10. All exhibits must be removed from the Fairgrounds between 4pm-6pm Sunday of the Fair unless other arrangements are made with the superintendent prior to the show.
- 11. Exhibitors of livestock are responsible for cleaning of stalls and their exhibit area prior to departure on Sunday.
- 12. Exhibitors in Junior Departments must be between ages of 8-20 years as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of current Fair year. All ages determined as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of current Fair year.
- 13. Livestock show questions will be addressed by the livestock committee. All committee decisions are final.
- 14. Livestock exhibitors must have all required forms filled out completely and turned into appropriate superintendent before they will be allowed to exhibit their project(s).
- 15. Anyone showing or presenting ribbons or awards for any of the livestock shows must be at least 8 years old as of January 1st of the current fair year.

ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS must be prepared to provide a copy or a digital image of the YQCA certificate upon request of a livestock superintendant.

The 2019 Lodi Agricultural Fair Swine Show is non-terminal. Please refer to the https://datcp.wi.gov/Documents/FairRulesAnimals2019.pdf website for ALL Livestock testing required before our fair! Your veterinarian cleared health papers will be required to be turned into the appropriate Superintendent BEFORE you will be able to unload your animals

As Wisconsin continues to promote Food Safety in all areas of our fairs, starting fall of 2017, Wisconsin replaced the MAQA (Meat Animal Quality Assurance) program with the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) national program. This new and interactive program provides youth several options for an annual quality assurance certification. YQCA was created for youth in the Beef, Dairy, Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine projects. This new program gives families more flexibility in acquiring this much needed information which trains youth in improving the care of food animals and promoting a higher level of consumer food safety. The livestock industry and businesses are constantly striving for high quality, wholesome products; therefore, youth in food animal projects should assist in this effort.

### Online training – cost of \$12.00 - The online course can be done anytime – year round In person training – cost of \$3.00 Both MUST pre-register (including payment) through YQCA.org

Of reminder, Wisconsin State Fair and other national exhibitions will require certification in YQCA for participation for 2019 events and beyond. Wisconsin State Fair will be in contact sometime in January. ## LODI AGRICULTURAL FAIR CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

(adapted from IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics)

Exhibitors at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example.

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered and shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians as required by the Wisconsin Department of Trade and Consumer Protection

2. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair or livestock shows.

3. Animals and animal pens and animal areas are to be kept clean and free of trash. Bedding is to be disposed of in provided manure spreaders. All pens must be completely cleaned out at the end of the fair.

4. Animals that may enter the food chain will be free of volatile drug residues. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state regulations and rules.

5. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event even if in accordance with federal, and state statutes, regulations and rules.

6. At any time after an animal arrives on the fairgrounds, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian or as prescribed in writing by a licensed veterinarian.

7. An animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means. Altering of an animal's appearance will be considered unethical fitting. Unethical fitting shall include, but not limited to:

The use of clenbuterol.

Any surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g. administration of fluid via stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen)

Any attempt to change the degree of firmness (e.g. icing of animals).

Any attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development

Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally with an irritant or counter-irritant, substances used to artificially enhance or change the conformation of the udder, use of any device to create or enhance the udder crease or plugging of the teat canal.

8. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals causing swelling or use of excessive force to brace or control an animal, using electrical devices, or other similar practices are unacceptable and are prohibited.

9. All exhibitors and their families must be respectful to others. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair board members, superintendents, volunteers, other exhibitors, or fair visitors before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. All judges, fair board members and show superintendents, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

All exhibitors, the immediate family and any other parties involved in the unethical fitting and/or showing of an animal may be subject to penalties as described below:

forfeiture of award(s) and premium(s)

forfeiture of auction proceeds

barred immediately from competition in the department in which the violation has occurred and/or from all departments entered

dismissal from the fairgrounds

barred from future competition in the Lodi Agricultural Fair.

### RULES AND CHECK IN PROCEDURES FOR LODI AGRICULTURAL FAIR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS – DATES JULY 11– 14, 2019

- Please refer to the DATCP website page <u>https://datcp.wi.gov/Documents/FairRulesAnimals2019.pdf</u> for ALL Livestock testing required before our fair! All animal health papers must be signed by your veterinarian and the required specific testing is completed before animals will be allowed to unload at the fairgrounds.
- The 2019 Lodi Agricultural Fair is requiring YQCA certification for ALL LIVESTOCK . ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS must be prepared to provide a copy or a digital image of the YQCA certificate upon request of livestock superintendant.
- 3. Check In times are from 2-6PM, on Thursday. All trailers/exhibitors need to enter the fairgrounds at the back entrance off of Hill View St, forming a line for check in. DO NOT STALL ANIMALS UNTIL THEY ARE CHECKED IN.
- 4. All livestock (swine, cattle & sheep) will be examined and checked in on the trailer. No animals are to be unloaded until permission is given from fair staff.
- 5. Our 2019 Swine Show is Non-terminal . A copy of your veterinarian cleared health papers will be required to be turned into the Swine Superintendant, and then your pigs will be assigned pens. DO NOT stall until given a pen number.
- 6. Sheep must have blankets/tubes off at check in.
- 7. All livestock MUST be identified with a PERMANENT ID (eartag, tattoo or leg band). Poultry must have a Leg Band. Tattoo's must be legible on Rabbits . All other livestock must have ID numbers visible from two feet away. This ID must be unique to the exhibitor and animal. There will be no swapping of ID between family members. No Eartag Substitutions will be allowed for market animals after the fair entry deadline. This identification must match that used on the Lodi Ag Fair entry form.
- 8. All exhibitors must provide a valid Premises ID number when entering any livestock exhibits. This includes: dairy, beef, swine, sheep, poultry, and horses. Rabbit exhibits do not require a Premises ID. Failure to provide a Premises ID will void all of the exhibitor's entries.
- 9. Any health issues with livestock on exhibit must be reported to the superintendent/fair office. A veterinarian will be contacted by LAF.
- 10. Exhibitors are to be present when their market animals are loaded out on Sunday. This is scheduled to start at 2pm for all sale animals. All other animals will be released at 4pm. It is suggested you be present by 10am on Sunday until your animal has left the fair grounds.

#### **OBJECTIVES:**

- 1. To provide incentive and to encourage participation in livestock feeding projects.
- 2. To provide 4-H and FFA junior and senior members, Girl Scout and Boy Scout members and any other junior organized organization, a market opportunity to have their market livestock projects sold.

#### **PROCEDURES:**

- 1. **Premises IDs are REQUIRED** for all livestock showing at the Fair. This includes dairy, beef, swine, sheep, poultry and horses. Rabbits, dogs and cats do not require a Premises ID. No livestock will be admitted on to the Fairgrounds without a valid Premises ID on file with the Fair Office. If you have animals at more than one location, please provide Premises IDs for all locations. For more information on applying for a Premises ID, visit www.wiid.org.
- Meat animal sale limited to junior exhibitors ages 8-20 as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the fair year. Animals must be carried as a project. The 2019 Lodi Agricultural Fair is requiring YQCA certification for ALL LIVESTOCK. ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS must be prepared to provide a copy or a digital image of the YQCA certificate upon request of livestock superintendant.
- 3. Exhibitors with animals in the sale will be required to sign a slip stating proper withdrawal times have been observed for any drugs used, to be turned in at the time of meat animal weigh-in.
- 4. All class winners must show for champion and reserve of their species.
- 5. Exhibitors must be present to weigh in AND load out market animals. Market Animals will be weighed in at the following times on Thursday:

Market Lambs 6:30pm Market Steers and Market Hogs 7pm

#### 6. A MANDATORY informational livestock meeting to be held at 8am on Friday morning of the fair.

All livestock sold at the sale on Saturday will not become the possession or the responsibility of the buyer until release time of the fair. Consignor is responsible to feed and care for animals until release time and must check with purchaser on arrangements of caring for animals until purchaser takes delivery. Consignor is responsible for reporting arrangements of animal to superintendant or fair office. CONSIGNOR WILL FURNISH A HALTER TO THE BUYER. A \$5.00 premium reduction will be taken if suitable rope halter is not provided to the buyer.

It is the consignor's responsibility to make arrangements with the buyer for animal removal on Sunday. The Exhibitor must be on hand starting at 2pm to load their sale animal unless approved by sale committee member. Violation of any stated rule or regulation will result in the exhibitor being ineligible for future meat sales.

#### Sale rules have been established by the meat animal sale committee as follows:

- 1. Sale will consist of 15 each of steers, lambs, and hogs and the small animals listed below.
- 2. Exhibitors allowed only one animal to be selected for sale.
- 3. All sale animals will be determined by the official judge of the day.
- 4. All decisions of the meat animal sale committee are final.

- 5. In the event that any meat animal tests positive for any form of drug residue used either legally or illegally, the ownership of the sale animal will revert back to the exhibitor and sale monies will be forfeited and returned to the buyer.
- 6. Sale order will be on species rotation.
- 7. Sale animals will be released at 2pm on Sunday.
- 8. TRUCKER CANNOT PICK UP SALE ANIMALS WITH OUT PURCHASE RECEIPT FROM THE BUYER.
- Sale commission will be 5% of selling price. 1.5% will be used for sales promotion, buyer recognition and provide liability insurance coverage. The remaining 3.5% will go into the Lodi Agricultural Fair Scholarship Fund.

- VIII. All cats and kittens MUST be brought to the show in a carrier wearing a harness/collar with a leash that will be worn the entire time of the show to prevent loss.
- IX. For judging all exhibitors will be required to bring their own animal to the judging table.
- X. This is a pet cat show. Judging includes general appearance and condition, temperament and proper handling, hair, coat, paws, nails and body build. Exhibitors will be judged on Showmanship, to include cat knowledge, as well as proper care and handling of the cat.

The Little Britches is a non-competitive, just-for-fun exhibition class for the 5-8 year-old children who are too young to show in the regular Dairy and Poultry competitive show classes. This is also a great mentoring opportunity for Jr. and Sr. Exhibitors at the Lodi Agricultural Fair. The Dairy and Poultry Shows are held on Saturday morning of the Lodi Agricultural Fair. Each Little Britches Exhibition Class will be held after the regular classes are finished competing in the same locations, thus, Poultry will be in the Poultry tent and Dairy in the outdoor showring, unless directed to a different location.

## **Little Britches Participant Rules:**

- Registration for the Little Britches youth must be completed on-line through the Lodi Agricultural Fair website at <u>www.LodiAgFair.com</u> and follow the rules for all livestock exhibitors. This includes any testing required prior to the Lodi Fair. The on-line entry is open between May 22<sup>nd</sup> and June 22<sup>nd</sup> of the current fair year. No late entries will be accepted. Livestock Premise ID and ear tags/leg bands for identification purposes will be required as per WI State rules. (The mentor will be able to supply this info for you). Enter: Dept 601 Class: A Lot 1 Showmanship Little Britches Dairy Enter: Dept 607 Class: A Lot: 1 Showmanship Little Britches Clucks n Ducks Please call the fair office if you need assistance 608-592-4499 or stop in by the Fair Office. Fair Office hours: Tues and Thurs eves 6pm-8pm and Saturday morning 10am-Noon during the month of June.
- 2. The youth must be mentored by one of the following: by a current Lodi Fair exhibitor, a former Lodi Fair exhibitor or an adult familiar with the animal. If the mentor is not a current Lodi Fair exhibitor, the Little Britches Committee will pair up the youth and mentor with an exhibiting club/group, so the animal will be stalled or housed near them for additional support.
- 3. The youth must be between 5-8 years of age at the time of the show and who are not eligible to exhibit in Jr. Livestock Classes.
- 4. Parent/guardians must complete and sign a waiver form AND attach it to the on-line fair entry. Please bring a copy or have a photo on your phone the day of the show just in case it wasn't received by the fair office; a copy may be requested by the Little Britches show manager before the child enters the showring.
- 5. The parent/guardian **MUST** be present at both the time of mentoring and show time.
- 6. The fair emcee will have a microphone and will ask the child questions regarding the animal. Questions that may be asked could be: breed, age, name of the animal, what it eats, how it is taken care of, who owns it, etc.

## Jr./Sr. Exhibitor Mentors Rules:

- 1. The Little Britches Mentor must be one of the following: a current Lodi Fair exhibitor, a former Lodi Fair exhibitor or an adult familiar with the animal in one of these species departments: Dairy or Poultry.
- 2. The animal must be housed on the fairgrounds during the entire fair with an appointed exhibiting club/group at the Lodi Fair. The Little Britches committee will pair up the youth and mentor for the animal to be stalled or housed near for additional support.
- 3. At all times, the Mentor is to keep safety in mind and **NEVER** leave the Little Britches participant alone or unsupervised with the animal.
- 4. Animals must be healthy, clean and ready for exhibition like any other fair project animal and cared for every day of the fair.
- 5. ALL the mentoring will be done under the supervision of the child's parent/guardian.
- 6. Each mentor will spend at least 15 to 30 minutes teaching his/her "Little Britches" participant about the care of the animal and will be present when the animal is presented to the Fair emcee or fair official. Keeping the animal secure but not interfering with the showing of the animal.
- 7. Dairy animals will only be of the Spring Calf age, nothing older.
- 8. The Jr./Sr. Exhibitor mentor will complete and sign a participation mentor form along with their parent/guardian signature.
- 9. This is a general class, so there will not be a division of the class by breed, animal age or child's age. It will just be a group lined up.
- 10. For those Jr or Senior exhibitors who mentor through this Little Britches Exhibition, this is an educational extension of the species project and will be credited as a part of your volunteerism qualification for the Lodi Agricultural Fair Livestock Scholarship available for graduating high school seniors.



## SENIOR CITIZEN DIVISION RULES

Superintendents - Mary Heintz, Nancy Ripp, Joyce Schmid

The senior citizen division is open to exhibitors age 62 or older as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current fair year. An exhibitor may not enter exhibits in both Open Class and Senior Division in the same year. If an exhibitor does enter in both Open and Senior, the Senior Division entries will not be judged. Seniors living in nursing homes, assisted living residences, senior apartments, etc. are encouraged to enter.
